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SAINTFIELD TO GET COMMUNITY CENTRE

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
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Since Gerry Lowe, the chairman of the Saintfield Development Association, first requested the Council to fund a feasibility study in 2007, there has been steady progress towards a community/ leisure facility for Saintfield.

The feasibility study and the subsequent economic appraisal were completed and unanimously approved by Down District councillors by 2010.

The next step was to identify and purchase a site. Negotiations with the owners of three possible sites were initiated but, for various reasons fell through.

A development plan for Saintfield was drawn up in June 2012, which generated a huge public response and confirmed the need for a community/ leisure facility. The Council redoubled efforts to purchase a site

In February 2013 the Council identified a preferred site, industrial buildings opposite the Saintfield High School, and submitted a planning application for change of use of the site to a community/leisure facility. The Council also approved £3.5

million for Saintfield in its capital budget for 2013/14. Again, councillors were unanimous in approving both of these proposals.

The next step is to complete a full public consultation to finalise the facilities to be provided inside and around the new facility.

It is hoped that Sport NI, the schools in Saintfield and the youth service will be involved and a model facility will be achieved to fulfill the needs of Saintfield for decades to come.

Planter Sponsorship

Last year the association, together with some enthusiastic volunteers and help from some of the traders, renovated the well on the Fair Green.

We also worked with local traders to encourage them to put floral displays outside their business premises. There was much praise from local people and comments on how the displays made Saintfield a more attractive place in which to live, shop and visit.

Spurred on by their enthusiasm

we are hoping to have even better displays this year. Your association has decided that instead of hanging baskets, we would like to have planters and



railing displays, which will be easier to see and enjoy.

It would be very much appreciated if any family, business or individual would be willing to sponsor a display for £50. A plaque of acknowledgement would be placed in the planter. Donations in memory of loved ones would also be very welcome.

Chair's Viewpoint

(The Origins of Saintfield Development Association)

For many years, Saintfield Town Committee, a dedicated group of volunteers, acted as community representatives in dealings with council and statutory agencies. The committee was instrumental in having the village centre designated as a conservation area in 1997, thereby protecting its architectural heritage, and in raising substantial Heritage Lottery Funding for building improvements in 2000.

The Town Committee were best known for two major initiatives, the Christmas Fair and Saintfield in Bloom, For over twenty years the Christmas Fair on Saintfield's Main Street has introduced thousands of children to the excitement and goodwill of Christmas, most of them never realising the huge amount of voluntary effort that made the evening so much fun. Saintfield in Bloom was also very successful in the 1990s, Saintfield winning many categories, including Ulster in Bloom.

Saintfield Regeneration Committee urged our councillors to find funds for the regeneration of our Main Street and footpaths, to create a public park on the town hill, to enlarge the public car park and open the existing alleyways onto the shopping area, to formalize a heritage trail around the village and to clean and sanitise our waterways. By the end of our second year, we had secured

funding for our first village plan which formally identified our wishes.

Realising that they would have more clout working together, the Saintfield Town Committee and Saintfield Regeneration Committee merged to form Saintfield Town Regeneration Committee and, indeed, things began to happen. Two of our original aspirations were the creation of gateway signs on the arterial routes entering the village and the development of a memorial garden to commemorate all those who died at the Battle of Saintfield in 1798. Both of these projects were achieved, bringing with them a degree of civic pride. The installation of decorative benches and a floral village centerpiece followed.

We achieved greater and more diverse community representation and we became more professional in our approach to potential funders. However, the financial crash postponed our hopes of an Environmental Improvement Scheme to re-vamp the Main Street despite many productive meetings with councillors and statutory agencies. We successfully persuaded Down District Council to carry out a feasibility study to show the need for a Community Centre and enhanced sports facilities.

A revised "Integrated Village Development Plan" was produced with the

help and support of the Council and Down Rural Area Partnership. Local responses to the public survey were overwhelming, showing the huge enthusiasm from all ages and interest groups. The Infrastructure Sub-committee has applied for substantial lottery funding for refurbishing properties in the Conservation Area and DRAP assistance has been requested for the creation of an identifiable village square. The Communications Subcommittee has developed an excellent website, interacted very successfully with the entire populace through social media, developed a healthy relationship with the village traders and produced this newsletter. The Green Saintfield Subcommittee is driving forward major projects to clean up the village and to make it more aesthetically pleasing to residents and visitors. The Events Subcommittee is working on a new and exciting programme for the year ahead. Most importantly, though, the irreversible commitment of 4.4 million to Saintfield by DDC to purchase and develop the site of our Community Centre and Sports Facility is a vindication for all those countless hours of leisure time, over many years, sacrificed by the community volunteers and a just reward for the Saintfield ratepayers.



Francis Hutcheson's Grave Identified

Francis Hutcheson is probably the person born in Saintfield who has had the greatest influence for good on the world. In spite of being a famous

philosopher during his own lifetime in Europe and the United States he is little know today in Northern Ireland. In fact his exact birthplace is not known today and, until recently, his burial place was unknown.



Fergus Whelan, an enthusiast for the writings of Francis Hutcheson and their influence on the evolution of liberal democracy, has just recently found proof of the exact location of his grave. Hutcheson loved Dublin, and it was known that he died while on a visit to that city in 1746.

Fergus has established the following evidence for the site of Francis Hutcheson's grave.

Dublin City Council has an information display at St Mary's Church which states that Mr Francis Hutcheson and his cousin Mr William Bruce are buried there. This information was gleaned from the St Mary's burial records which are now held at the Representative Church Library, Dublin.

In Stewart, A.T.Q., "The Deeper Silence: The Hidden Origins of the United Irishmen", the author states that Mr William Bruce, who died in 1755, was buried in the same grave as Mr Francis Hutcheson.

In Ray Bateson's book "The End", it states that from the burial records it shows that Francis Hutcheson was buried at St Mary's and that part of Bruce's headstone is still visible.

Therefore it can be concluded that Francis is buried in the churchyard of Saint Mary's, which is also the final resting place of his cousin William Bruce. Today Saint Mary's is a public

park located in what is now Wolfe Tone Street.

Many United Irishmen would have revered the memory of Francis

Hutcheson. Some of the leaders of the Dublin United Irishmen are remembered in the street and placenames of the city. Most Dubliners can direct a visitor to Wolfe Tone Street, Oliver Bond Street, Russell Street, Lord

Edward Street and Emmet Road.

It is ironic that Francis Hutcheson's pupil, Adam Smith, is still remembered and revered around the world when the man whom Smith called the 'never

to be forgotten Hutcheson' lies in what is now an unmarked grave.

In 2003 the people of Saintfield, County Down unveiled a plaque to Hutcheson, very appropriately on the wall of the First Presbyterian Church where his grandfather had been minister and where the young Francis would have first imbibed his Dissenting Protestant principles. Fergus Whelan, as the secretary of the Francis Hutcheson Memorial Committee, on Saturday 1st December 2012 unveiled the plaque below to commemorate the burial site of Francis Hutcheson.
