WHAT CAN YOU DO FOR SAINTFIELD?

Saintfield is a brilliant place to live, for all sorts of reasons. It is a harmonious community with excellent sports facilities and Rowallane Gardens nearby. It has a range of independent shops on the Main Street and a farmers' market. It is big enough to have good community assets and small enough to feel at home in. Saintfield offers a lot to its residents.

Looking into the medium-term future, it is likely that the Council will have declining income and so the services it provides to residents will likely lessen rather than increase. If communities want to maintain the way of life they have enjoyed in the past, they will have to take on more community activities themselves. This means that more local people will have to volunteer, in some way, to ensure that their children's quality of life is maintained.

In Saintfield there are over fifty community groups, including schools, churches, sports clubs, youth organisations and other interest groups. All of these are maintained by dedicated volunteers, but they all could do more with additional help.

- SDA Communications Team, led by Brian Gamble and including lan Mack, David Greer and Val Smyth. This team strives to improve communications within SDA and between SDA, the media and the wider community. Also included are Vivien Lovell and her dedicated team who allocate and deliver the printed copies of Saintfield News to households and businesses around Saintfield in all weathers.

The team organises events to raise funds for SDA and Events use this funding for community benefit, including the Christmas Fair and Community Open Days.

The team lobbies for improvements to the town (including the new Square layout, the community centre, the windmill park project, the new footpath along Todd's Hill and the upgrading of the sewage system).
- SDA Greens Team, led by Lawrence Murphy and including Vivien Lovell, Muriel Massey, Annette Kincaid, Michael Coyle, Heather and Malcom Foreman, Santha and Seamus McGrath, Lyn and Richard Mackender, Gwen Gawly, Lily Henderson, Denis and Maureen Conn, Brendan Burns and Dorothy Walker. The team plants and maintains the floral displays, wild flower areas and shrub beds around Saintfield and also does most of the street cleaning in the village.
- SDA Funding and Finance Team, including Kevin Young, Lawrence Murphy, Paul McGeown, Brendan Burns and Martyn Todd. As SDA is a company limited by guarantee with charitable status, this team ensures that its governance is maintained at a high standard and meets all statutory requirements.

The team also ensures that the Association is financially sustainable, applying for grants and other funding where appropriate.

- SDA representation on the Saintfield Inter-agency group, currently Martyn Todd. This group, comprises all the local councillors and statutory bodies and meets quarterly to discuss the priority needs of Saintfield in terms of policing, Council services, roads, housing, etc. As well as SDA, the Saintfield Community Estates Partnership represents Saintfield residents at this group.

- Rowallane District Electoral Area group, currently Brian Gamble and Lawrence Murphy. The Rowallane DEA is one of nine DEAs in the Council area and meets to discuss and prioritise the local needs that are the responsibility of the Council.
- SDA representation on the Rowallane Advisory Group, recently Janice McHenry and Fiona Watters. This group is led by Choice Housing and focuses on social needs in the area and identifies possible sources of funding to try to meet these needs. The current priority identified is isolation, particularly among the elderly. SDA, with other

community groups would like to find a way to help older people use social media to keep in touch with friends and family.

For Saintfield to get more from all these activities, the load needs to be spread across more people. Please ask yourself "What can I do for Saintfield?" If the pandemic has had a positive effect, it has helped us to appreciate family and community more than ever before.

Building B

Newry, Mourne and Down Council, who own the Saintfield Community Centre site, are seeking expressions of interest for the remaining spaces in the buildings on the site.

These are Unit B and the other, empty, part of Unit C. Unit B is the large building at the back of the canopy, comprising approximately 7.500 sq. ft. The front part of Unit C is where the existing community facilities are comprising a large hall, studio,

meeting room and foyer. The remaining part of Unit C is approximately 4,300 sq. ft. The closing date for submitting expressions of interest is 25th January 2021, so time is short for putting a bid together.

From previous consultation exercises SDA knows that the outstanding community priorities include a community gym and a coffee shop. SDA proposes to put in a bid to include additional community

rooms for hire, a coffee shop and a heritage display area, where the history of, and stories about, the past in Saintfield could be told.

WINDMILL PARK PROJECT



As has been reported in local papers, the project to provide a community park for everyone who lives in or around Saintfield has taken another step forward.

Thanks to the lobbying by our local councillors, supported by the larger political parties in Newry, Mourne and Down Council, SDA has been granted an easement for access to the proposed park in the windmill field from the Council-owned community centre site. This means that the existing car park at the community centre can be used by those wanting to walk around the outdoor community space.

The next step in the project is to apply for planning approval for change of use for the

field to become a park. As the field is larger than one hectare, it is classed as a major project and so needs a twelve-week preapplication consultation process before a planning application can be submitted to the Council. SDA has initiated this process and has put information about the proposals on the website
